## **UNICEF**

This week in school we have been focusing on **Article 13** of the Convention on the Rights of a Child: *'Every child must be free to say what they think and to seek and receive all kinds of information, as long as it is within the law.'* 

As a school we are focusing on our **Level 1 Assessment Day** which is taking place on **Thursday 30**<sup>th</sup> **November**. Our Steering Group will be having a final meeting on Wednesday 29<sup>th</sup> to discuss the assessment day itself as well as their roles on the day. One such role will be taking our assessor, Jilly, on a learning walk of our school, explaining to her how our school environment reflects a commitment to promoting children's rights. Jilly will be going into various classrooms to talk to pupils, as well as talking to a selection of staff and governors to get a feel for how the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child (UNCRC) has been introduced into our school and the impact this has had. Jilly will be with us on the day from 10.00am-3.00pm.

The 'Rights Child of the Week' over the past two weeks has been:

Lola (Year 3) for always being polite to children and adults.
Caden (Year 6) for showing respect to visitors to the school.

# Why is reading so important?

Evidence suggests that children who read for enjoyment every day not only perform better in reading tests than those who don't, but also develop a broader vocabulary, increased general knowledge and a better understanding of other cultures.

In fact, there's evidence to suggest that reading for pleasure is more likely to determine whether a child does well at school than their social or economic background.



# What difference could I make as a parent?

The short answer is: a lot! Parents are by far the most important educators in a child's life and it's never too young for a child to start, even if you're only reading with your child for a few minutes a day.

Before they're born, babies learn to recognise their parents' voices. Reading to your baby from the time they're born gives them the comfort of your voice and increases their exposure to language.



### Building vocabulary and understanding

Learning to read is about listening and understanding as well as working out print. Through hearing stories, children are exposed to a rich and wide vocabulary. This helps them build their own vocabulary and improve their understanding when they listen, which is vital as they start to read. It's important for them to understand how stories work as well. Even if your child doesn't understand every word, they'ill hear new sounds, words and phrases which they can then try out, copying what they have heard.

As children start to learn to read at school, you can play an important role in helping to keep them interested in books, finding out what interests them and helping them to find books that will be engaging and fun for them. Give time to helping them practise reading the books they will bring home from school.

They learnt many things including how a tyre is inflated and changed, where a vehicle is spray painted and how the paint is mixed. They also looked at the various tools that mechanics use as well as seeing the different parts of an engine which had been taken apart. They learnt how computers test what parts of a vehicle are or are not working as well as seeing where the vehicles are tested and worked on. The pupils had the opportunity to ask the questions they had thought of as well as sitting in Vanstone's tow truck and learning about how the garage help members of the public who have broken down! A huge thank you to Vanstone's garage for allowing Year F to visit and taking the time out of their very busy day to talk to us. The children learned lots and listened behaved beautifully. Finally, a big thank you to our adult helpers for coming on the trip with us.
