A Year of PE successes at St Stephens

We are delighted to announce that we have achieved the Gold School Games Mark Award for the 2016/17 academic year.

The School Games Mark is a Government led award scheme launched in 2012, facilitated by the Youth Sport Trust to reward schools for their commitment to the development of competition across their school and into the community, and we are delighted to have been recognised for our success. This year we have competed in a variety of different sports including netball, football, tag rugby, dance and multiskills, as well as attending festivals for dance, gymnastics, orienteering and hockey. As part of our application, we were asked to fulfil criteria in the areas of participation, competition, workforce and clubs, and we are pleased that the hard work of everyone at our school has been rewarded this year. We look forward to applying once again in 2018!

This year we were also fortunate enough to have our visit from our two Paralympic footballers, Dan James and Keryn Seal, where we raised a total of £602.20. The children were highly motivated by the visit and still talk about it now. We also won 'The equipment package' as part of a competition run by Premier League Primary Stars.

The children have enjoyed all of their sessions run by Plymouth Argyle this year. As well as the football sessions run as part of the PE lessons and the additional after school club, PAFC have also led sessions on cricket and athletics. We are looking forward to working with them a lot more next year where they will be delivering many alternative sports alongside football.

Children from Year 6 and Foundation have enjoyed riding their bikes this year. Many children in Year 6 took part in Bikeability at the beginning of the year where, alongside learning about riding and looking after a bike, they learnt about road safety and keeping safe when riding a bike. Children from our Foundation Class also took part in Balanceability sessions where they were learning how to ride a balance bike and some simple safety rules.

We hope that all of the children keep active over the summer and have a go at some activities that they may not have had a go at before.

Many thank to Mrs Hooper who has lead our PE for the last year. Her continuing efforts/ hard work and commitment to PE has meant the children at St Stephens have been provided with a real range of PE experiences. Mr Bullock will be taking this role on in September 2017.

UNICEF at St Stephens

This week in school we have been focusing on Article 31 of the Convention on the Rights of a Child: *Every child has the right to relax, play and take part in a wide range of cultural and artistic activities.*'

We interviewed some Year 5 pupils recently to decide which two children would be the new steering group representatives for Year 6 next year. Congratulations to **Marley** and **Mia** who were the successful applicants! Both of these pupils were positively vocal in their interview about UNICEF and becoming a 'Rights Respecting School'. We are sure that they will prove to be fantastic steering group members when we reconvene for our first meeting in September.

A big thank you to **Chennai, Izabel and Phoebe** who have been superb Steering Group members this year representing Year 6. Becoming a Rights Respecting School and achieving 'Level 1' is a long process and much of the work required so far has happened 'in the background.' They have all been fantastic in setting up a 'Rights Respecting' approach around the school and have always attended our meetings with enthusiasm and positivity. The other Steering Group members wish them all the best for their move to college.

We have seen a positive impact of UNICEF so far with many pupils commenting on their rights and responsibilities and how this manifests itself in their behaviour and in the behaviour of others. Lots of classes have been learning about their 'rights' this week by completing various activities. We are sure that this understanding will be consolidated over the next academic year.

A year of residential success for all our Key Stage Two classes: Year 4 residential to Slapton Sands

Year 4 visited Slapton Sands for a two day (one night) residential on the 13th-14th July. We had glorious weather and all enjoyed an afternoon on the beach to develop their geographical and fieldwork expertise using key skills of reciprocity (team-work), problem solving and resilience through exploring the theme 'What would it be like to be shipwrecked on a beach? Pupils used their imaginative skills to create their own Treasure Island, made maps, used basic compass skills to bury and locate treasure and learnt to light a fire without matches.

We also experienced a walk in the woods at twilight, listening to the sounds of the woodland animals, birds and insects – although one pupil was convinced he heard a tiger, we can guarantee this was not the case!

After a hearty breakfast, we enjoyed a range of team challenge games - trying to solve the 'impossipuzzle', using giant skis to traverse the field of lava, moving a ball along drainpipes down a course, sorting the giant shapes to make a square and moving across 'boulders' and remembering a route without falling into the swamp. Our final activity was the low ropes challenge. The pupils took on the challenge of moving along the ropes or spotting one another; they were able to appreciate both their own skills and the importance of supporting others when trying to complete the challenge. The outcome was an increased sense of confidence, a positive attitude and a greater understanding of risk. We all enjoyed a wonderful experience and are looking forward to new residential adventures in Year 5.



Year 3 Residential

In relation to our topic "The Stone Age to the Iron Age" Class 3 went on a residential visit to Slapton Sands in the Spring Term. We stayed one night and took part in two days of activities.

On the first day, we went down to the woods and made dens using natural resources. We learned how to 'hunt', how to tie knots and how to make willow fences. Later we had a hot chocolate and told stories around the campfire.

The next day, we went 'foraging' for food and learned about the different types of foods that were safe and poisonous to eat. We also learned how to light a fire without matches! To finish off we cooked some marsh-mallows around a huge campfire and sang songs.

We had an absolutely brilliant time on our residential trip to Slapton Sands! Everyone showed fantastic behaviour and really immersed themselves in their learning. Please look on Class 3's page for lots of pictures of what we all got up to!

They also had the opportunity to visit the Houses of Parliament and the London Eye—many thanks to Mrs Spence, Mr Terry, Mrs Paul and Miss Meakin for giving up their time to make this an incredibly successful trip.

We have held outdoor learning days where children have worked together across the age groups. We have also had a morning recently where Year Six have lead an activity morning for Key Stage Two showing their ever improving learning leader skills.
