School Improvement

As mentioned in our last newsletter we are focussing on our curriculum offer across the Multi Academy Trust. Reviewing our Intent, Implementation and Impact has made us consider what is the most important learning opportunities and subject knowledge for our pupils at St Stephens Academy—What do we want them to remember when they leave us? With this in mind I felt it was essential to ask the most important people in our school-the pupils! This week in assembly we have been discussing what makes an inspirational curriculum—what else could we do better? Lots of ideas have been shared and the pupils are regularly adding to the curriculum sheet I have in my office. Lots of children love the opportunities to learn geography and history facts and new skills in context not just in a book, e.g. cooking or building. It is important that we have the correct resources when working in Art or Design Technology so we can make exciting things. More sport is another key request, especially learning new games such as basketball. Many pupils want maths to be more cross curricular and they enjoy challenges in all areas. A different set of clubs—e.g. gardening has been sug-



gested and learning about famous people who have inspired others. All the school love visits and visitors. The list is growing daily and all ideas will be seriously considered when planning what and how we will be teaching our curriculum. If you have any ideas we would love to hear them too.












Year 1 have been investigating capacity in maths. Our challenge was to investigate whether the tallest container had the largest

decided in their groups which defensive strategy they preferred and set up their formation. Then,








International Boys' Choirs Workshop

RNLI Visit—write up by Zak and Jess (Year 6) Today in the school hall at St Stephens Community Academy, Jack and Tremain from Bude lifeguard crew talked to the children about **STAYING SAFE** on the beach and in the sea.

Useful information;

All lifeguards wear red shorts and yellow t-shirts, so that they can be easily identified on the beach, during the summer season in Cornwall.

Lifeguards patrol our beaches from 10:00am to 6:00pm daily

Some important safety rules;

Always swim where there are lifeguards present on the beach

Always make sure you wear sunglasses, a sunhat and plenty of sunscreen

Always stay together on the beach and in the sea.

Flags to look out for on the beach;

The red and yellow flags mean lifeguards are on patrol.

The red flag means dangerous to bathe or swim and you should not enter the water. The quarter black and white flag indicates the area zoned for surf craft and Malibu boards

The orange wind sock flag indicates wind direction.

If you see somebody is in danger or having difficulties in the sea contact 999 or 112

and ask for the coastguard. Remember never enter the water to try and save a person that is struggling in the water.

Without a doubt Jake and Tremain gave us some amazing facts about being a lifeguard and most importantly staying safe on the beach and in the sea.


