School Improvement

This week the children across the school have been undertaking a variety of written assessments in reading, writing and maths. These, alongside our on-going professional observations, marking and feedback, help to give us a bigger picture of what skills and knowledge your children know and what the next steps are.

They have also been taking part in an online 'pupil voice' questionnaire linked to Visible Learning(Y2-Y6) This is to find out what helps our children learn and what they believe is important to move their learning forwards. Pupil

voice is highly valued so we look forward to reading the outcomes of this survey. **As a Visible Learning school our aim is that..**

Pupils take ownership of their own learning. They know where they are within the curriculum and what their next steps are. Using their target grids they can track their own progress. The pupils know what to do when they come across something they don't know and have strategies to progress with their learning. Pupils seek feedback and respond to it, and more importantly they give feedback to staff about their teaching.

It's also that time of year when the teachers are busy writing their end of year reports for every child. Its been such a 'different' year due to the lockdowns so the reports will reflect this.

Your child's report will be sent via an online live link from 9th July.

school trip since the Covid restrictions have been in place - and the sun shone.



Year 2 had a fantastic day taking part in Arena's Wild Tribe First Aid workshop.

Wild Tribe First Aid is an outdoor learning programme developed to incorporate the governments' inclusion of the following objectives in the updated Physical Health and Mental Wellbeing curriculum for primary children:

- Pupils Should Know...
 - ☐ How to make a clear and efficient call to emergency services if necessary.
 - ☐ Concepts of basic first aid, for example dealing with common injuries, including head injuries.
- The key points that the children learnt were:
 - ☐ What is first aid?
 - ☐ Recognising dangers and hazards
 - ☐ Conducting a primary survey on a casualty
 - ☐ Placing a casualty in the recovery position
 - ☐ Understanding what is in a first aid kit
 - ☐ How and when to call the emergency services
 - ☐ Common injuries and how to deal with them

No donations required -quite simply lets "Celebrate Individuality".



















Exploring and Discovering In Class 7
