Pupil Forum and UNICEF

She explained how food is grown and harvested, and the process it goes through until we get to eat it! She also explained how times have changed in this whole process.

Children were then given the opportunity to make a harvest sheaf, as this is how some people used to show their thanks for the harvest.

"Moulding bread is not as easy as it looks!" says Jazzy (Pupil Forum member).

Adam (another member of the Pupil Forum) thoroughly enjoyed the activity and had this to say.

"I learned how to make the ear of the corn. It was really complicated, but I really enjoyed using the technique." The sheaf is displayed in the hall for the whole school to see.
