
School Improvement

Over this half term we shall be focussing our staff development time reviewing and identifying our curriculum's key aims, moral judgements and school values in line with the new Education Inspection Framework put out for consultation by Ofsted. It makes interesting reading. The report is structured by reference to the three 'I's.

The Three 'I's: intent, implementation and impact

Intent – the extent to which schools demonstrate a rich and varied curriculum, one which is not simply focused on teaching to the tests or achieving good exam results.

Implementation – that teachers present all aspects of this broad and balanced cur-



riculum (not just English and Maths) and are visibly encouraging discussion and the whole-hearted engagement of pupils, without an over-concentration on outcomes and with a far greater emphasis on processes.

Impact – that learners develop detailed knowledge and skills across the whole curriculum. It follows that there will be a greater emphasis on the behaviour and attitudes of pupils and a much less single-lens approach to data.

sunset picture as well as some other activities. See the website for more photos!










We are so immensely proud of this selfless act of kindness demonstrated by Ronnie in Year 5.
