## I can recall square numbers up to 12<sup>2</sup> and their square roots.

By the end of this half term, children should know the following facts. The aim is for them to recall these facts instantly.

$ ^2 =   \times   =  $	$\sqrt{1} = 1$
$2^2 = 2 \times 2 = 4$	$\sqrt{4} = 2$
$3^2 = 3 \times 3 = 9$	$\sqrt{9} = 3$
$4^2 = 4 \times 4 = 16$	$\sqrt{16} = 4$
$5^2 = 5 \times 5 = 25$	$\sqrt{25} = 5$
$6^2 = 6 \times 6 = 36$	
$7^2 = 7 \times 7 = 49$	$\sqrt{36} = 6$
$8^2 = 8 \times 8 = 64$	$\sqrt{49} = 7$
$9^2 = 9 \times 9 = 81$	$\sqrt{64} = 8$
$10^2 = 10 \times 10 = 100$	$\sqrt{81} = 9$
<sup>2</sup> =    ×    =  2	$\sqrt{100} = 10$
12 <sup>2</sup> = 12 × 12 = 144	$\sqrt{121} = 11$
	$\sqrt{144} = 12$

Key Vocabulary	
What is 8 squared?	
What is 7 multiplied by itself?	
What is the square root of 144?	
Is 81 a square number?	

Children should also be able to recognise whether a number below 150 is a square number or not.
